Under the heading Miscellanea, essays will be published dealing with topics considered to be of general interest to the readers. All contributions will be refereed for their compatibility with this criterion.

A Bibliography on Telephone Survey Methodology

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1. Introduction

During the last two decades or so, the methods and techniques of data collection for sample surveys have undergone a major transformation. While personal interviews and mail surveys constituted the principal methods of gathering information in surveys during the earlier period, the use of telephone interviews has attained greater and greater significance as a means of gathering data in recent years in both private and public sectors. Among the countries with extensive telephone coverage, the use of the telephone by some government agencies and survey organizations has become the dominant mode of data collection (see, e.g., Lyberg and Kasprzyk 1991). Among the reasons for increased interest in telephone surveys, compared to face to face interviews, include increased coverage of the population by telephone, lower cost of data collection, improved sampling methods through random digit dialing, and improved technology.

There exists a considerable body of literature on the theoretical and empirical justifications for every area of telephone survey methodology in the form of journal articles, chapters in handbooks as well as unpublished material. In addition, a special issue entitled "The Emergence of Computer-Assisted Survey Research" was published by the journal *Sociological Methods and Research* (Freeman and Shanks 1983). Similarly, the *Journal of Official Statistics*, published by Statistics Sweden (Groves and Lyberg 1988) and *Survey Methodology*, published by Statistics Canada (Singh 1991), have recently devoted special issues to telephone survey methodology. In addition, several books have appeared that specialize in telephone survey

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methodology (see, e.g., Blankenship 1977; De Sola Pool 1977; Dillman 1978; Frey 1989; Groves and Kahn 1979; Groves et al. 1988; Körmendi and Noordhoek 1989; and Lavrakas 1993). The books by Blankenship (1977), Dillman (1978), Frey (1989) and Lavrakas (1993) are primarily in the form of monographs, intended as "how-to" references, describing survey sampling and design procedures currently used in different organizations. The text by De Sola Pool (1977) is mainly a sociological study and discusses and social implications of the introduction of the telephone in the United States. The work by Groves and Kahn (1979) provides a national comparison of surveys by telephone with personal interviews. The material in the publication by Körmendi and Noordhoek (1989) is a compilation of the information gained in Denmark on the use of telephone interviews and comprises a study of validity in which telephone responses are compared with the information obtained from registers. The volume by Groves et al. (1988) comprises contributions from an international group of experts involved in telephone surveys and presents a comprehensive review of some recent developments in the field.

The purpose of this bibliography is to list accurately the majority of published and unpublished material related to telephone surveys. It is intended to facilitate the work of other researchers and practitioners in the field.

2. Methods

This bibliography covers published as well as unpublished material. This is an important feature in view of how much of the experience in telephone interviewing is contained in unpublished mimeographs and reports and papers presented at meetings and conferences. The bibliography is divided into four parts. Part 1 (Section 5.1) comprises primarily journal articles or articles appearing in edited books or special books such as yearbooks, proceedings, encyclopaedia, etc., which provide a treatment of telephone survey methodology. Part 2 (Section 5.2) lists works published in the form of a book, monograph, thesis or other volumes appearing in book format. Part 3 (Section 5.3) lists a number of articles and papers presented at various professional meetings and conferences. Part 4 (Section 5.4) lists a number of articles which are still in the form of unpublished mimeographs and reports (research report, technical report, internal memorandum and so forth). The criteria for selecting entries for inclusion in the bibliography were mainly based on the consideration that the cited reference provides a substantial and useful discussion of certain aspects of telephone survey research and methodology. Publications describing merely the use of telephone interviews as the mode of data collection, without any methodological implications, are generally not included. Publications containing a general discussion of the telephone and its sociological and research implications have been included. Some pertinent papers and articles on general sampling methods have also been included.

In the compilation of this bibliography, considerable use was made of the previously published bibliographies included in the books on telephone survey methodology, reviewed in the introductory section, particularly the one by Groves et al. (1988). All suitable entries from these publications have been included. In addition,

we have consulted the following annual series that index the field of statistics and other quantitative areas:

The bulk of the bibliography contains references from non-statistical journals, such as those in public opinion, marketing, advertising, consumer research and other related journals; statistical journals primarily covering articles pertaining to official statistics and survey research methodology, and from a variety of special publications such as proceedings of conferences and workshops on telephone surveys. For the purpose of assembling published material for inclusion in the bibliography; the following journals were searched systematically for relevant references for the period 1975–1993:

In addition, several other journals, periodicals and proceedings of conferences and workshops in the fields of statistics, sociology, epidemiology, public health, and management sciences were scanned on a selective basis.

3. Description of Entries

The entries for articles are presented in the following form: Author(s) name(s), year of publication, title of the article, name of the journal, volume number, and page numbers. The sequence for books is: Author(s) name(s), year of publication, title of book, name of publishing house, and page numbers (if applicable). Only page numbers are mentioned for the articles appearing in yearbooks, reports and proceedings, as they generally do not have volume numbers or other continuity.

In order to save space, the convenient abbreviations for the journals, periodicals, proceedings, and other publications cited in the bibliography, similar to the ones employed by the *Current Index to Statistics*, have been introduced. A list of the abbreviations and complete names of the publications is given in an Appendix at the end of the bibliography.
